PRESIDENT'S REPORT

My article this month is directed primarily at our newer members who are keen to develop/improve/master the art of casting a fly but rather than over "empty water" or even a vacant back yard, in a location where, with a little luck, a nice rainbow trout could well end up at the hook end of a line.

I am referring to Parkinson's Lake, a small dune lake in the Maioro area towards the southern end of Karioitahi Beach near Waiuku. The lake is approximately 1.90 hectares in

area and generally surrounded by open pasture and low tree growth and importantly is only around one hours drive away (outside peak traffic times).

The lake is stocked with 2 year old rainbows each year and is open to licensed anglers all year round. The catch (and keep) limit is 5 fish and anglers are encouraged to report any tagged fish to Auckland/Waikato Fish and Game including size/weight and date when caught. From a fly fishing perspective, there are a range of flies which work well in the lake whether they be dry, wet or nymph and a good starting point would be through our club treasurer, Barrie Barnes's website at "iloveflyfishing.kiwi".

My personal interest in this lake began in the late 1970's when my best buddy and his new wife, shifted to Otaua, near Waiuku and I spent many days helping to build their new home. My buddy's father-in-law, a seasoned fly fisherman, had introduced both of us to the "gentle art" and once locals told us about Parkinson's Lake, we had no problem finding time to "drop tools" and head up to the lake which from their place, was only a 10 minute drive. With our, by today's standards, rudimentary 2-piece fibreglass rods and level lines, we enjoyed modest success and in fact, my first fish, caught on a dry fly, was a 5 inch Rudd! The rainbow trout we caught were very poor, emaciated specimens which, upon cleaning, revealed shocking infestation of shagworms. The lake was also badly affected by solid weed banks which certainly restricted casting options.

However, in subsequent years and as a result of intense scientific study, Grass Carp were introduced to the lake which then largely dealt with the massive weed issue, following which any remaining fish including the grass carp, rudd, tench, smelt and bullies were eradicated to establish a new "starting point".


Native water plants re-established from dormant sources in the lake bed and native bullies were re-introduced as a food source for trout. It has now become a convenient and accessible trout fishery with the main limitation to fly fisherfolk being the elevated position near to the coast and the (generally) prevailing sou-westerly wind. But of course, there are plenty of calm days as well!

I would certainly encourage our newer members and those seeking to improve their casting skills, to consider a visit to this lovely little lake which in many ways, could serve as an "apprenticeship" to the joy of fighting the "leviathans" of Lake Otamangakau which club members will once again be visiting in the annual trip at the end of November.



The Coromandel is fishing well with a mix of smaller fish and some solid line pullers as well. Two recent visits, have seen higher flows but clear water and plenty of insect action. The swallows and fantails have been working throughout the day eating what looks like sizeable mayflies. The flies that have been working best are Royal Wulf drys size 12-14, and Pheasant Tail variants size 14-16.

FISH & GAME NZ UPDATE FROM ACTING CHIEF EXECUTIVE RICHIE COSGROVE

Welcome to this month's Fish & Game update. As we continue through what is proving to be a busy and significant period for our organisation, I wanted to share some important developments with you.

Reform Proposals

The Minister for Hunting and Fishing James Meager has announced proposals for significant changes to how Fish & Game operates. His proposals aim to modernise our structure whilst maintaining the core principles that have served anglers and hunters well for decades.

The key changes being proposed include centralising licence sales through a national system, establishing a national strategic plan to improve coordination across regions, and expanding voting rights to more licence holders. Importantly, what won't change is your

fishing and hunting experience - seasons, bag limits, and areas you can fish and hunt will still be decided by your local regional council, and the fundamental principle of "user pays, user says" remains intact.

We understand there will be different views about these proposed changes across the angling and hunting community. As a statutory organisation, we remain committed to being an impartial source of information throughout this reform process, ensuring transparency whilst respecting the diverse perspectives that exist. We have set up this webpage to keep you informed.

A bill will be introduced to Parliament later this year, and a select committee will hear views from the community. This will be an important opportunity for licence holders to have their say on the future direction of Fish & Game.

Showcasing Our Value

Recent weeks have provided excellent opportunities to demonstrate the value of what we do. Our parliamentary hunt was a great success, giving us the chance to showcase the importance of hunting and our habitat work to decision-makers. The weekend highlighted how game bird hunting brings together conservation, community, and outdoor recreation in ways that benefit both wildlife and local economies.

I was also pleased to participate in a TV story about the economic value of angling, highlighting research which showed that recreational fishing injects over \$138 million into local economies and supports jobs in communities up and down the country. These advocacy opportunities are crucial for ensuring decision-makers understand the real-world value of our work.

Looking Ahead

Whilst we navigate the reform discussions, rest assured we haven't lost sight of our day-to-day mission. Licence holders depend on us to manage their fisheries and game bird resources, advocate for habitat protection, and ensure compliance with regulations. This core work continues to be our priority.

Thank you for your continued support as we work together to secure a strong future for New Zealand's angling and hunting heritage.

ANGLERS RALLY FOR FLOOD-AFFECTED FARMERS

The massive June 2025 flood, which battered the Motueka Catchment, was one for the record books. The 100-year event has devastated low-lying areas of the valley, damaging houses, orchards, and farmland, and we feel for those who have been affected.

Nelson Marlborough staff member Jacob Lucas has been coordinating the Fish & Game volunteer response and says that farm clean-up days are already underway, utilising a workforce comprised of anglers and hunters.

"The response from the community to help people affected by the flood has been fantastic. We are just one of many groups out there working hard to help restore farms, and so far, we've had a fantastic turnout from trout anglers who know the river well and have relationships with some of the affected landowners, many of whom generously provide fishing access through their farms to the river."

WOMEN ON THE FLY UPDATE

Women on the Fly NZ (WoTF NZ) is a self-funded, grassroots community representing women who fly fish across Aotearoa, committed to growing participation through inclusive events, mentorship, and community-building.

Partnership with Eastern Fish & Game

In May, a successful weekend workshop, hosted in partnership with Eastern Fish & Game, welcomed 24 female beginners. Organised by WoTF NZ's Jill Sweeny, with support from Tauranga Anglers Club and Rotorua Anglers Association, the weekend offered foundational fly-fishing skills led by experienced mentors.

Club Membership Boost

Since WoTF NZ's inception, we've seen substantial growth in female membership across the fishing clubs who WoTF NZ has partnered with for events, including Kapiti, Nelson, South Canterbury and Christchurch clubs. We believe many other clubs are benefiting from the wave of interest in fly fishing.

A Voice for Women Who Fly Fish

To ensure women's voices are heard, WoTF NZ surveyed 711 community members about the Family Licence structure, receiving 51 responses. 70.6% found the current rules too

restrictive and 64.7% said it limits their ability to fish independently. Respondents strongly advocated for options allowing both adults to fish independently and access to voting rights.

IN PRAISE OF SCRUFFY FLIES

I've been an angler and fly tier for decades and it's easy to get sucked into tying neat — strive for — artistic creations. I was. But I've modified any thinking and I'm better in myself for realising that the perfectly tied fly is not necessarily what the trout will opt to take.

That perfectly tied fly may be good for the human spirit and perception and personal satisfaction but the trout is the final judge. What the trout says, goes. It's boss.

Yes. I've always been proud of tying a clean, pretty fly, but perhaps, just perhaps, the reality is different?

Ever noticed how beaten up, how scruffy a trout fly gets with use and a few trout to its credit, it gets some feathers torn off and it's bedraggled, but it's fish catching powers increase?

The good old spider wet fly is not a neat symmetrical one. It's just a suggestion of a sparse body and sparse hackle. In fact sparseness is an attribute. This strongly suggests that trout flies whether tied by yourself for bought from a tackle shop are over-dressed.

But, I suspect trout might go for scruffy flies better—and I might have a theory to explain for thinking like that. It's to do with predator-prey relationships.

Predators pick off the easy ones first, you know the sick, the weaker of the prey. This isn't a new idea. It's long been recognised by competent biologists that a predator benefits the prey population by picking off the sick and/or weaker ones. This ensures a quality prey species. The stronger, more alert ones escape or don't get picked off so much. Or the predator instinctively knows a weaker one.

Instinctive

I read of one chap who studies this closely. He used a small mesh net to collect hatching insects. A number looked miniature wrecks as they struggled to get out of their larval shucks, naturally scruffy with the shucks party attached. The hatching flies struggling in the surface film to get out of their larval skins are the most vulnerable phase if their hatch. Temporarily they are trapped.

Now I'm not suggesting trout have brains to think "Ah! Easy meat" that one. Their brain may be small and you can argue they're not intelligent, but they're highly instinctive. Why is the Hare and Copper nymph so good? It looks scruffy. Why is dubbing whether hare, possum, rabbit or seals fur so good? A major factor is their tiny little fibres stick out here, there and every which way.

So in a hatch of mayfly in the day time or in the evening caddis flies, the ones you see in the air are the fully hatched and fit ones. The only insects that we try to imitate with perfectly tied flies were flying, out of reach of the trout which were picking off the ones halfway out if their shucks struggling in the surface film.

So if you're tying flies don't worry if as you take it from the vice, it looks scruffy and not neatly symmetrical like that perfectly tied artificial fly. The trout don't notice the imperfections — in fact they love it.
