PRESIDENT'S REPORT

A couple of weeks ago, fellow club member, Mark Norton and I, made a trip to an area which I had not visited for about 30 years. Prior to that time, I had visited the “Rotorua Lakes” regularly. Apart from the desire to cast a fly, the visit also involved staying at a friend’s house to check out it’s suitability for future club trips. The home is situated at Ruato Bay on Lake Rotoiti very close to the intersection of the road to Lake Okataina.

James and his Father Errol, have developed a spacious area in the basement of the house below a 1920's bungalow which was relocated from Auckland.

This area is self-contained and provides 2 bedrooms, a bathroom, kitchen and lounge dining area. Through a combination of beds and bunks, it could accommodate up to 7 anglers. At this stage, James and Errol are still to decide on a per head tariff but given the location, I think it will prove to be popular.

As I said, it is situated at Ruato Bay and is literally, just across the road from the beach. After June 30th each year when the fishing season closes for most areas, many lake frontage spots in the Rotorua area remain open including Ruato. A Fish and Game Winter Licence, which covers from April 1st to 30th September allows continual fishing and my licence costing \$94.00.

In addition to Ruato, much of the foreshore is also open right around to "the pipe" at Hinehopu. Okataina beachfront, part of Lake Rotoma and sections of Lake Tarawera frontages are also available. As the spawning season comes on, quite large numbers of mature fish gather along the lake edges well within casting distance and often just a few metres from the edge. Floating lines with small flies (lumo's if dark) and sinking lines with "muppets" do the trick. The best fishing seems to occur when there is steady rain which can lead to rivulets developing across the beaches attracting fish to the edges. It is simply a matter of dressing appropriately for the inclement conditions but in any event, it is only either a short walk or a convenient drive back to a warm shower, etc.

Mark and I caught up with "seasoned" club angler, Hans Sabrowski, at Rangiuru Bay on Lake Tarawera on the Saturday evening and Hans was able to describe where to wade and cast to best advantage. Unfortunately, neither Mark nor I were able to hook-up but later in the evening Hans caught some beautiful fish. I, on the other hand, found a pesky hole in my waders and foolishly had my phone in my raincoat pocket which obviously flooded and it was "goodnight" phone! To top it off, when we got up next morning to take the boat out onto Lake Rotoiti, the trailer had a flat tyre. Yippee!!

Once final details are sorted regarding accommodation, I will report back but in the meantime, remember that 30th June need not be an end to your winter fishing.

TIPS AND TRICKS

At an earlier Club Meeting we had a session all about Tips and Tricks that we might choose to use with our fishing. With that in mind we will use this section for any helpful little Tips that anyone may have that can benefit us all. - 1) STOP, and check around you before you make that cast. Look for trees and snags sticking up out of the river behind you and above you. Firstly, it's not nesting season and the Trout will not be waiting on a branch 10 feet above you. Secondly, there is nothing so frustrating as tying on a new rig, after you left the last two flies on the snag in that last pool, and then putting your first cast in the new pool straight into a tree, normally just out of reach of retrieval.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

I was thinking it would be nice to have some Trout recipes in the Newsletter again so I have gone all the way back to recipes we had in the Newsletter over 16 years ago. Hopefully they are helpful and will encourage some 'adventurous' cooking.

The following recipe is from the Turangi Rotary Club Trout Recipe Book. This book is full of excellent ideas so next time you are in Turangi why not pick up a copy. All money raised goes to good causes.

Smoked Trout Ball

250gms smoked Trout

200gms cream cheese

1 Tablespoon grated onion

A splash of chilli sauce

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 teaspoon horseradish sauce

Pepper

½ Cup chopped nuts of your choice (Walnuts are good but you can use most sorts...Pistachio would be a good colour mix with the parsley)

Mince the fish.

Mix in the cream cheese, juice, onion, sauces, and pepper.

Roll into balls and cover with parsley and nuts.

Serve with crackers and / or sliced carrots and celery.

SPECTRE OF TROUT FARMING

From the NZFFA Newsletter

Trout farming seems to have eternal attraction for politicians and others in Wellington.

In August 2018 Parliament’s primary production select committee recommended a petition to allow trout farming be given “serious consideration”. Committee members seemed more than happy to expose New Zealand’s sport fisheries, said to generate more than \$1 billion per year, to risks from speculative fish farming ventures.

In July 2025 the Ministry for Regulation issued a statement showing it sees trout farming as a goldmine waiting to be exploited. Officials predicted that if the current ban on trout farming could be removed it would bring “significant economic growth opportunities with more local jobs for rural people. “

But trout farming carried on overseas shows it is capital intensive, high risk and gives poor returns. A New Zealand trout farmer could never compete against the large scale operations conducted by Asian competitors who are much closer to markets.

Ministry officials were equally bullish that risks could be contained if trout farming started in New Zealand, stating:

“Getting rid of the rules against Trout farming would bring us into line with other countries – Australia, Canada, the United Kingdom and Europe.

Existing laws – including the Fisheries Act 1996, Conservation Act 1987, and Resource Management Act 1991 – would continue to make sure the risks were managed.”

Given the constant battle fisheries inspectors are fighting against criminals who poach paua, snapper and other marine resources to feed a buoyant black market, anglers may feel entitled to reject these optimistic comments.

FISH & GAME REFORMS

From the NZFFA Newsletter

On 5 June 2025 the Minister for Hunting and Fishing, the Hon James Meager, announced a wide-ranging reform was intended for Fish & Game New Zealand.

The minister summarised key elements of the reform:

- *Clarifying the roles and responsibilities so that regional Fish & Game councils focus on delivering hunting and fishing opportunities on the ground, with the New Zealand Council responsible for administrative tasks and policies.*
- *Shifting to a nationalised fee collection system to reduce double handling of licence fees and ensuring funding follows the demand on the resource.*
- *Making more licence holders eligible to vote and stand in Fish & Game elections and requiring councillors to comply with professional standards.*
- *Requiring Fish & Game councils to better consider the interests of other stakeholders such as farmers and the aviation sector in decision-making.*
- *Requiring a national policy around advocacy and restricting court proceedings to within that policy.*

Fish & Game license holders need to examine these proposals very carefully. There is a red flag in the last one; the government intends that Fish & Game’s advocacy functions will be “revised” so regional Fish & Game Councils will be able to take court action in relation to advocacy only if explicitly approved by the New Zealand Fish & Game Council or the Minister and within a new restricted advocacy policy. Note: how the policy will be worked out (and who will do that) has not been made clear.

The requirement to “better consider” the interests of farmers (and the aviation sector) is clearly the result of lobbying by rural groups. The farming and aviation sectors should be able to look after their own interests.

Legislation devoted solely to Fish & Game New Zealand is to be introduced later.

It is worth remembering that National’s outdoor policy in July 2023 stated:

“Support Fish & Game New Zealand and protect trout and salmon fishing.”

To a politician “support” is a very broad term capable of a wide variety of meanings.

FISH & GAME NZ - UPDATE FROM CHIEF EXECUTIVE CORINA JORDAN

Welcome to this month's Fish & Game update, where we are advocating for our community as parties gear up for the general election in November.

Fish & Game has been working hard to make sure the voices of New Zealand's 175,000 anglers and game bird hunters are heard by the people who want to govern this country. Earlier this year we sent every major political party a questionnaire covering the issues that matter most to our licence holders: public access, fishing and hunting traditions, wetland protection, resource management reform, Water Conservation Orders, and Fish & Game's statutory role. The deadline for responses has passed, and we will be publishing what the parties had to say in our upcoming fishing edition of the magazine.

That edition reaches a print readership of 130,000 and a total audience of 208,000 across print and digital platforms. It is one of the most-read magazines in the country, and we think it is the right place to put these responses in front of the people they matter to most. I have been meeting politicians across the political spectrum advocating for fresh water angling and game bird hunting. There's keen interest in the value of angling and game bird hunting and politicians have been positive and receptive to our views.
