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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

With the arrival of winter and the associated Taupo spawning runs, I have been reflecting on some of the spots which I used to visit on my many solo trips to the region back in the 70's and 80's. One of my favourites was the Waipehi stream about 4km's south of Hatepe and very close to Jellicoe Point. While fishing is not permitted in the stream itself, fishing the lake edge where the stream enters, never failed to provide me with exciting "hookups" and quite a few of the fish were in excess of 3kg's.

Access to the stream is extremely user friendly, particularly when approaching from the south, as the short roadway descends from SH1 down to a small reserve and car parking area beside the stream. Entering from the north requires a little more care as bends in the main road can reduce the view of oncoming traffic. Although only of modest size, the Waipahi actually carries quite a large number of spawning fish throughout the season, particularly during periods of rain. The stream rises well inland in largely bush and scrub covered areas and passes under the main road carriageway through two large concrete pipes. The discharge of water has worn out a hole and created a “gathering pool” at the foot of the low waterfall where many fish congregate before leaping up into the pipes to continue their journey upstream.

A quiet and careful walk down the side of the stream to the lake will often reveal surprisingly large numbers of both rainbows and browns awaiting their turn during “pulses” in the flow and the arrival of darkness. While the sight is clearly one to get any angler’s “blood flowing”, it is also a fascinating example of nature at work and provides a wonderful opportunity to introduce younger people and children to the “real world” away from cell phone and tablet screens.

In terms of gear requirements, the lake edge is reasonably shallow so I would recommend a floating line or a slow sinker with the usual streamer flies but after dark it might pay to consider a fast sinking line with a very short leader (say, 300mm) and a muppet fly with a bit of luminous sparkle in the tie. With the lake edge vegetation behind, one would need to wade out a bit for casting or alternatively, employ a roll cast.

As I said, the onset of rain generally initiates fish movement and my best results have always been in inclement weather, particularly in a brisk south-westerly when the wave action tends to make the fish congregate quite close in. So just wrap up warm and dry because as the Scots say: “There is no such thing as bad weather, just inappropriate clothing”. Tight lines!

Auckland / Waikato

Taupo

Glo Bug season has begun! The following is from the Sporting Life Fishing Report today.....*"Reports coming through the shop over the past few days have been very encouraging, with a number of fresh fish caught across the Central Plateau rivers. It's great to see, especially after what has been a slower start to the winter runs than many of us were expecting.*

Out on the lake, anglers have been landing plenty of fresh, fat fish, which suggests there are still more waiting to make their way into the river systems to spawn.

With the rivers still sitting fairly low and clear, egg patterns have been doing the damage first thing in the morning. As the sun gets higher, switching over to more natural patterns has continued to be the most productive approach.

Milzie has been out covering several of the local rivers and found success on all of them, sending through some great intel from his time on the water.

We approached each pool with long leaders and fine winter tippet (5–6 lb fluorocarbon). Larger, brighter "slushie" patterns worked well in the early morning,

while more natural, subdued bomb patterns came into their own once the bright conditions set in.

For those who enjoy swinging flies, wet lining also fished well. Light, presentation-focused heads such as the Rio Scandi and Guideline ULS performed exceptionally, as their delicate presentation was much better suited to the low, clear flows. We found the heavier, splashier nature of Skagit heads was more likely to put fish down in these conditions.”

Saltwater

The Kahawai may have gone but that means the Trev’s are here! Time for a bit of low tide walking to likely spots.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

I was thinking it would be nice to have some Trout recipes in the Newsletter again so I have gone all the way back to recipes we had in the Newsletter over 16 years ago. Hopefully they are helpful and will encourage some 'adventurous' cooking.

This recipe is courtesy of Shane French when he ran the Waitahanui Lodge, right on the edge of Lake Taupo, and once again looks delicious.

Trout Curry

Yummy!!!! I love cooking curry and this is so simple. Trout takes on flavours from all sorts of things so curry is a good choice.

You will need.

- 1 diced onion
 - 4 good sized cloves of Garlic diced.
 - 3 Tbls good curry powder.
 - 4 cups fish stock, or chicken stock.
 - 1 Banana.
 - 2 Tbls spicy fruit chutney.
 - 1 tsp smoked Paprika.
 - 1 250gm tub sour cream.
 - 1 tsp Valcom Kaffir lime Leaves.
 - 1 Good Trout diced into 2cm pieces.
- Good fry pan!!!



Fry onion and Garlic in a little oil and add curry powder. Cook this out for 5 minutes on low heat then add fish or chicken stock and rest of ingredients except fish. Bring to the boil then drop to the simmer and reduce until it thickens. Add the trout pieces 10 minutes before serving and increase heat.
Serve with rice, Naan bread and a green salad.

TROUT POACHING IN NGONGOTAHĀ SPARKS CONCERN AS LOCALS FIGHT TO PROTECT STREAM

Trout poaching has reared its ugly head in Ngongotahā, with locals urging those responsible not to spoil what they say is a world-famous fishing spot.

Local man Simon Aston loves to fish, particularly the Ngongotahā Stream near Rotorua, but there's nothing that gets his back up more than seeing poachers taking advantage.

He runs the Ngo Trout Fishing Club, a non-profit organisation that has grown a following of about 800 people since he set it up in September.

The club mainly teaches young people to fish and promotes the fisheries in the Ngongotahā area – waterways Aston said were world-famous for the quality of their trout.

He said that quality was at risk, however, if poachers continued to flout the rules.

Most of the poaching happened early in the morning, before light, but other times it was in broad daylight.

Aston said he saw a school group fishing the Ngongotahā Stream, down from the bridge near the entry to the village, and only metres away were two poachers.

While the Rotorua Daily Post was interviewing Aston this week, a local came up to him and advised of some trout hanging up in trees across the road.

Aston said the poachers often left them there so they were not caught leaving with more than their bag limit of eight. He said sometimes they caught up to 40 trout, and would return later to collect the rest.

“We have a lot of kids fish this part of the stream and we don't think it's very fair that the older people using roe out of trout [are] catching fish from this part of the river, and kids don't get a chance to catch their fish.”

Aston said local fishermen tried to educate people, but some did not want to be educated.

“We have got a lot of kids who fish this stream and we want to keep them as safe as possible as well.”

Fellow club member Todd Ellery said the club was doing great things, including involving more women in fishing and its monthly “golden fish” award for submitted photos of people’s catches.

He said people who spotted poachers were usually not keen to approach them themselves.

“These days you don’t know what you’re in for ... You see some guys down here and they have that many fish, they can’t carry them all.”

Ellery said it was a shame others didn’t respect the waterways.

New Zealand Fish & Game Eastern Region chief executive officer Arash Alaeinia said the Rotorua area had many prime and internationally visited fishing locations, with world-class trophy rainbow and brown trout in the lakes and waterways.

Trout season officially ends on June 30 and reopens on October 1.

Alaeinia said many anglers used fishing as a way to supplement their food basket.

While poaching did occur, he did not believe it was getting worse. He said Fish & Game had officers doing regular patrols and also responded to tip-offs on the 24-hour 0800 POACHING line.

He said there were various ways in which people fished illegally, including using nets, spears, roe, bread, bait, taking more than the eight fish permitted (including a maximum of two brown trout) and fishing without a valid fishing licence.

“We have strict rules with severe penalties for those found to be breaking the rules.”

The penalties for a poaching prosecution through the court system vary, from forfeiture of all fishing gear, including vehicles or boats, to a fine of up to \$100,000 fine or a two-year jail term.

“We often prosecute offenders who have purposely and regularly broken the law.”

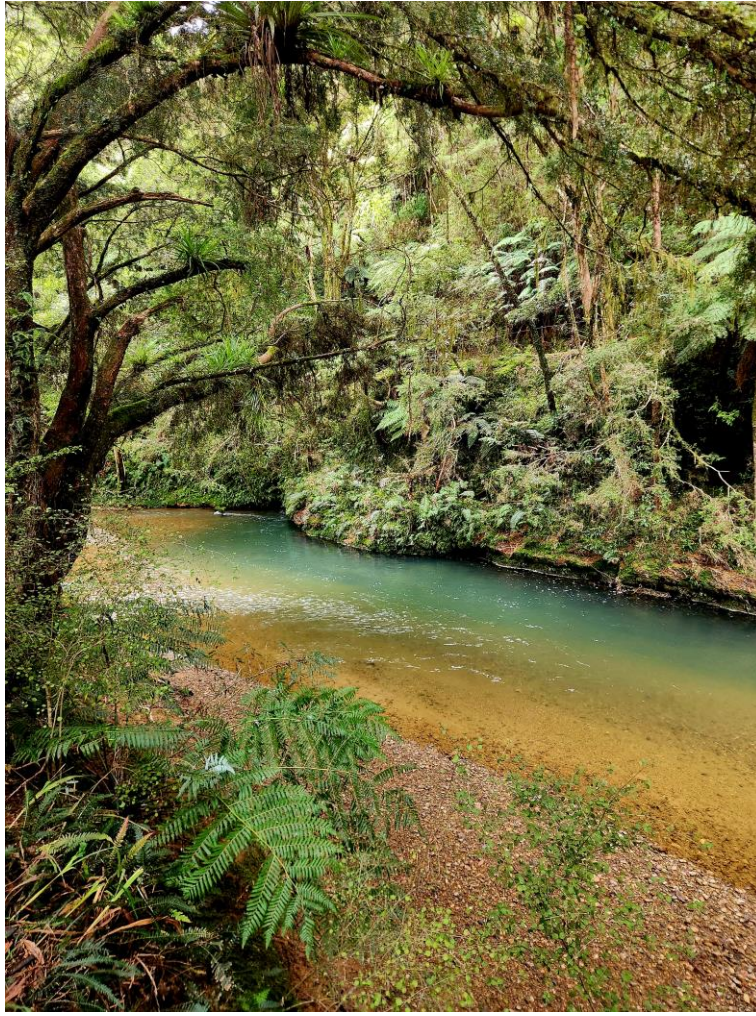
He said Fish & Game received no funding from the Government and was funded through anglers and hunters buying licences.

This season’s adult licences included a local rate of \$125 for the whole season, with a day licence costing \$25.

THE MANIC GUIDE TO CASTING BOMBS

I often spend time watching others on the river and observing their technique and whenever I head north for a Turangi winter fly fishing mission I see a number anglers, both visiting and local struggling to cast some pretty heavy stuff overhead style. There are easier ways, and it doesn't have to be so hard.

These days it's not all about fishing super heavy and deep, the Tongariro river has changed and so have fly designs and techniques, so more often that not you can fish a lot lighter that you might think. However there will always be days when the flow is up or the fish are sitting in faster and deep water and it calls for brute force to get down and in front of our quarry.

When fly casting, we are usually told that line speed is king, and a tight loop is a good loop. However throw a Tongariro style [bomb](#), or a couple of split shot into the mix and our requirements change, fast.

If you throw a heavy fly back and forwards with speed then all sorts of mayhem occurs when your loop straightens: the fly will kick, bounce, tuck and in general cause nightmares for the angler like dropping the line and smashing off beads, tangling in the foliage behind, or copping a heavy fly to the back of the skull.

Heavy flies and tight loops are a recipe for tangles and broken rod tips, so let's consider five easy changes we can make to better handle these heavy flies.

WIDEN YOUR CASTING ARC

By widening casting arc you open up your loop, keeping those heavier flies away from both the rod tip, and rod leg (bottom leg) of the loop.

SLOW DOWN YOUR CASTING STROKE

By slowing down our stroke we can immediately reduce our line speed, diminishing the kick which occurs when a heavy fly turns over at speed, and concentrate on flexing our rod deeper to bring in the more powerful mid - butt section to handle our heavier rig. Try casting a bomb and see how you go.

GO UP A LINE SIZE

Quite simply it takes mass, to move mass. Slowing down your rod tip recovery by over lining isn't a big deal for as mentioned, we don't need breakneck line speed, and most modern fly rods can handle it. If you prefer, go up a rod size to match. A long belly line

such as the [Airflo Superflo Max Ridge 2.0 Power Taper](#) allows you to carry line, rather than shoot it, making it easier to control heavy flies at distance.

ELIMINATE SLACK LINE

Lift your flies to the surface before you begin. By simply beginning your cast with your rod tip low to the water, and taking in a few strips of line to remove any slack your entire cast will be more efficient: the moment you move your rod tip, you will be in contact with your fly. Lifting a deep sunk fly from the water takes a lot of energy and can close your available casting arc significantly. To raise a sunk fly to the surface, simply raise your rod tip, slow and smooth so that the line / leader junction is free of the water. The mass of your line will now 'own' your fly, and lift it cleanly as you accelerate. A roll cast / roll cast pickup / C spey will also lift your fly to the surface in preparation of your cast.

EMPLOY THE ELLIPTICAL CAST

Simply, this is a back cast, and forward cast performed under constant tension, on different planes. Imagine you are drawing an oval with the rod tip, beginning with a side arm back cast and moving smoothly into an overhead forward cast. The benefit of this cast is that keeps the fly away from the body / rod tip and eliminates the kick of a heavy fly straightening on the back cast. This is THE way to handle heavier flies.

So don't let your technique dictate how deep you get. By utilising the correct weight for the job, choosing your presentation, and delivering it with the right cast for the job you can own that pool.
